SCHOLARSHIPS & AWARDS

The College of Human Sciences is pleased to have a number of scholarships and awards which are available to its students. Below are descriptions of the many opportunities that students can pursue. SCHOLARSHIPS

Anamerle Arant Memorial Scholarship

Anamerle Arant was an alumna of the class of 1926 and maintained a strong interest in and commitment to the College. Following her death in 1985, Ms. Arant's brothers and sisters established this scholarship honoring her memory. Undergraduate or graduate majors in Human Sciences who have achieved academic excellence, as demonstrated by grade point average or ACT/SAT scores, are eligible for the scholarship.

Dorothy Dean Arnold Scholarship

The Dorothy Dean Arnold Scholarship is made possible through an endowment established by R. G. Arnold and alumni/friends honoring the late Dorothy Dean Arnold, a former faculty member who taught in the area of apparel and textiles. The scholarship is open to undergraduate majors in Human Sciences who demonstrate financial need and have a minimum grade point average of 3.0. Preference is given to Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management majors.

Carolyn Horn Beck Endowment for Scholarship

The Carolyn Horn Beck Endowment for Scholarship was established in 2000 by Martin L. Beck as a memorial to Carolyn Horn Beck, an alumna of the class of 1958. To be considered for this undergraduate scholarship, students must demonstrate financial need and have a minimum grade point average of 2.5. Preference will be given to students from Crenshaw County, Alabama

Alma S. Bentley Scholarship

Dr. Alma S. Bentley was an alumna of the class of 1926 and, while at Auburn, served as President of the Human Sciences Club. The Bentley Scholarship was established in 1973 by a bequest from her estate. Undergraduate or graduate majors in Human Sciences, who demonstrate need and have a minimum grade point average of 2.0, may be considered for this scholarship.

Bernice Bienenstock Furniture Library Scholarship

The Bernice Bienenstock Furniture Library houses the largest and most comprehensive collection of books pertaining to furniture in the world. The collection encompasses all significant volumes published since 1640 and includes the only complete collection of the original works of 18th century furniture masters in the United States. Applicants must be majors in Interior Design, demonstrate financial need, show professional promise in the Interior Design area and have a minimum grade point average of 2.5.

Dorry Ann Johnston Blackburn Endowment for Scholarships

This endowment was established by Dorry Ann Johnston Blackburn for the purpose of providing scholarships for students in the College of Human Sciences with a minimum grade point average of 3.0. Preference is given to students who are active in school and community activities and who demonstrate financial need.

Lee and Bob Cannon Endowment for Scholarship in Nutrition and Food Science

The Lee and Bob Cannon Endowment for Scholarship in Nutrition and Food Science was established in 1998 by the family and friends of Lee and Bob Cannon in honor of their 50th wedding anniversary. Undergraduate or graduate students in the Department of Nutrition and Food Science who have a minimum 3.0 cumulative grade point average are eligible for this scholarship.

The William Carter Company Endowment for Scholarships

In 2003, Frederick J. Rowan, II, Chairman and CEO, established the William Carter Company Endowment for Scholarships for majors in the Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management major. Students who have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 are eligible to apply for the scholarship.

Pao Sen Chi Memorial Endowment Fund for Scholarship

The Pao Sen Chi Memorial Endowment Fund for Scholarships was established in 1995 by Dr. Y-H Peggy Hsieh in memory of her father. Majors in Nutrition and Food Science, who have a 3.5 cumulative grade point average after completing the freshman year, are eligible for this scholarship.

College of Human Sciences Faculty Scholarship

In 1984, the faculty and staff established the College of Human Sciences Faculty Scholarship to honor retired faculty members from the College. Upon retirement, contributions in the retiree's name may be made to this endowment. Human Sciences undergraduates, who have a minimum 2.7 grade point average and have demonstrated financial need, are eligible to apply for the scholarship.

Ethel Woodruff Draper Endowment for Scholarship in Human Sciences

The Ethel Woodruff Draper Endowment for Scholarship in Human Sciences was established in 1997 by the J.W. and E.I. Woodruff Foundation in honor of Ms. Ethel Woodruff Draper. Congruent with the Human Sciences mission, Mrs. Draper devoted her life to improving "the quality of life for girls and women." Undergraduate or graduate students in any major in the College of Human Sciences who demonstrate academic excellence are eligible for this scholarship. Preference is given to students from the Chattahoochee River Valley (Muscookee, Harris and Chattahoochee counties in Georgia, and Lee and Russell counties in Alabama).

Elza Stewart Drummond Scholarship

The Elza Stewart Drummond Scholarship was established in 1994 by Ms. Barbara Drummond Thorne in memory of her mother. Students accepted or enrolled in a major in Nutrition and Food Science, and who have achieved academic excellence as evidenced by grade point average or ACT/SAT scores, are eligible for the scholarship.

Ruth Legg Galbraith Scholarship

Faculty, staff and friends established the Ruth Legg Galbraith Scholarship in 1985 in recognition of the leadership and contributions that Dr. Galbraith made to the College of Human Sciences. Dr. Galbraith came to Auburn in 1970 as Head of the Consumer Affairs Department and served as Dean of the College from 1973 to 1985. Undergraduates in any Human Sciences major who have a minimum grade point average of 2.7 and demonstrate financial need, are eligible for this scholarship.

Dana King Gatchell Scholarship

Dana King Gatchell was Head of the Department of Nutrition and Food Science from 1923 until 1956. Following her death in 1960, the Pi and Beta Sigma Chapters of Delta Kappa Gamma (an international education honorary) established the Dana King Gatchell Scholarship to honor "the rich contribution that Ms. Gatchell made in the education" of students at Auburn University. Junior or senior majors in the Department of Nutrition and Food Science, who have a minimum grade point average of 3.0, are eligible to compete for this scholarship.

David B. Haggard Endowment for Scholarships

This endowment was established in 2007 by Dr. & Mrs Warren O. Haggard in memory of their son, David B. Haggard. Students who have a minimum 3.0 grade point average, are a SO, JR or SR and demonstrate financial need are eligible for this scholarship. They must also have been a resident of Alabama for at least one year, have attended a junior or community college and must provide a letter of recommendation from the junior/community college.

Glenda S. Harris/Alabama Power Foundation Endowed Scholarship

The Glenda S. Harris/Alabama Power Foundation Endowed Scholarship was established in 2002 by the Alabama Power Foundation, Inc., in honor of Glenda S. Harris, an alumna of the class of 1961. Full-time undergraduate or graduate students in the Department of Nutrition and Food Science, who are Alabama residents and demonstrate academic excellence (3.0 or higher grade point average) are eligible to compete for this scholarship. Each scholarship shall be approximately equal to the amount of annual tuition, fees, books, and supplies (two academic terms or equivalent).

Dr. Susan and Representative Mike Hubbard Endowed Scholarship

This endowment was established by Dr. Susan and Representative Mike Hubbard for the purpose of providing scholarships for students in the College of Human Sciences who are enrolled in the HRMT Program. Preference is given to students from Lee County.

Johnston Industries Endowment for Scholarship

The Johnston Industries Endowment Fund for Scholarship was created in 1996 through the support of Johnston Industries, Inc. Students in any major in Human Sciences who demonstrate academic excellence may be considered for this scholarship.

Joyce and Roger Lethander Endowment for Scholarship

The Joyce and Roger Lethander Endowment for Scholarship was established by the Lethanders in 1997 for the purpose of providing scholarships for students in Human Sciences. To be eligible for this scholarship, students must be a Human Sciences major, a resident of the United States, and demonstrate an understanding of the philosophy of philanthropy practiced by the donors establishing this endowment. Recipients shall be known as the Lethander Scholars.

Don Logan - Southern Progress Endowed Scholarship

The Don Logan - Southern Progress Endowed Scholarship was established in 1996 by the Southern Progress Corporation in honor of Don Logan, Chairman, President and CEO of Time, Inc., and 1966 alumnus of Auburn. To be considered for this scholarship, students must be a major in Nutrition and Food Science and have a minimum 3.0 grade point average. Financial need may also be a consideration.

Jane Campbell Lorendo and Gene L. Lorendo Scholarship

Friends, former students, and colleagues of Jane Campbell Lorendo established a scholarship in her honor at the time of her retirement. Ms. Lorendo taught in the area of textile design from 1956 to 1983. Following the death of her husband in 2001, the scholarship was renamed as a memorial to both Jane and Gene Lorendo. The scholarship is intended to encourage students to expand professional and educational interest in the area of design by planning special and/or unique opportunities during an internship or for special study experience. Applicants must have completed one semester in residence at Auburn, be majors in Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management or Interior Design, and show professional promise in their area of study. An additional departmental application is required for the scholarship.

Arlene Rushing Lowe Fund for Excellence

This endowment was established by Darlene Fletcher Woodall, in memory of her mother, Arlene Rushing Lowe for students who are enrolled in the CAHS Program in the College of Human Sciences.

Belinda Reynolds Michaud Endowment for Scholarships

This endowment was established in 2006 by Steve Michaud, Mike Reynolds and W. Wayne Reynolds in memory of Belinda Reynolds Michaud to provide scholarships for incoming freshmen who have a 3.0 grade point average, have graduated from a high school in Montgomery and demonstrate financial need.

Sallye Roe Nunn Scholarship

The Sallye Roe Nunn Scholarship was established in 1989 by Patricia Nunn Barkuloo to honor the memory and accomplishments of her mother, Sallye Roe Nunn. The amount of each scholarship shall be approximately equal to the amount of annual tuition and fees (two academic terms or equivalent) for Alabama residents. To be eligible for this scholarship, applicants must be full-time students in Human Sciences, demonstrate financial need and academic excellence (3.0 grade point average or above).

Parthenon Prints/Bay Point Scholarship

The Parthenon Prints/Bay Point Scholarship was established in 1988 by Theonne Harris, President of Parthenon Prints, Inc. Full-time undergraduate majors in Interior Design or Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management, who demonstrate academic excellence, are eligible for this scholarship. First priority is given to those students from Bay County, Florida, or students who have graduated from a high school in Florida.

Delana Carol Pickens Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship was established in 1991 by the Alabama Power Foundation, Inc., as a memorial to Delana Carol Pickens, an alumna of the class of 1977. Ms. Pickens was killed in an airplane crash in Birmingham in 1991. To be eligible for this scholarship, a student must demonstrate academic excellence and financial need and must be enrolled in or accepted for enrollment in Human Sciences.

Jeanne M. Priester Doctoral Fellowship

Jeanne Priester, a 1958 graduate from the College, has maintained an extensive and distinguished career with the Cooperative Extension System. The Jeanne Priester Fellowship for Doctoral Study in Human Sciences was established in 1988 by her friends and colleagues to celebrate her selection as the 1988 Alumna of the Year from the College and to recognize the significant contributions she has made to the Human Sciences profession. Applicants must be admitted to the Auburn University Graduate School and to a doctoral program in Human Sciences. Priority will be given to individuals having a background with the Cooperative Extension System.

Sister Schubert Annual Scholarship for CHS@AU in Ariccia, Italy

In 2003, Patricia S. Barnes (sister Schubert) established the Sister Schubert Annual Scholarship for Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Ariccia, Italy. Juniors, seniors, or graduate students in good standing who have financial need and would like to study at the Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad campus in Ariccia, Italy are eligible for consideration for this scholarship.

Floris Copeland Sheppard Endowment for Scholarship

The Floris Copeland Sheppard Endowment for Scholarship was established in 1999 by a bequest from Ms. Sheppard's estate. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors in the Department of Human Development and Family Studies who plan to pursue a career in working with families and youth may be considered for this scholarship. Preference is given to those applicants who are former 4-H club members.

Marion Walker Spidle Scholarship

The Marion Walker Spidle Scholarship was named for the late Ms. Spidle who served as Dean of Women and Dean of the College from 1938-1966. In 1981, the Auburn Student Human Sciences Association honored the Dean Emeritus by establishing this endowment. To be considered for this scholarship, undergraduates must major in one of the areas of human sciences, have a 3.0 grade point average, be a member of the Student Human Sciences organization and demonstrate financial need.

Margaret Valentine Smith Annual Scholarship

The Margaret Valentine Smith Annual Scholarship was established in 1997 by Royal Cup Coffee, Inc. Juniors, seniors, or graduate students in the Department of Nutrition and Food Science who plan to pursue a career in dietetics may be considered for the scholarship. An additional departmental application is required for this scholarship.

Tiger Rags Scholarship/Graduate Fellowship

The Tiger Rags Scholarship/Graduate Fellowship is made possible through an endowment established by Tiger Rags, Inc., an Auburn based specialty apparel company. The scholarship/fellowship is to provide financial support for deserving students in Human Sciences. To be eligible for this undergraduate scholarship, a student must demonstrate academic excellence and be a full-time student in Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management. To be eligible for the graduate fellowship, students must be pursuing a graduate degree in Consumer Affairs and must maintain a 3.0 grade point average.

Women's Philanthropy Board Annual Scholarship

In 2003, the Women's Philanthropy Board (WPB) established an annual scholarship for undergraduate majors in the College of Human Sciences. Juniors or seniors who demonstrate financial need and have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 are eligible for the scholarship.

Women's Philanthropy Board Endowed Scholarship

To be eligible, student must be enrolled fulltime, maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 and have a demonstrated financial need.

AWARDS

Dorothy Dean Arnold Award

The Dorothy Dean Arnold Award is made possible through an endowment honoring the late Dorothy Dean Arnold, a former faculty member in apparel and textiles. The award is to recognize and honor the outstanding senior majoring in Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management. The recipient is selected by the Consumer Affairs departmental faculty. Students who graduate fall through summer semesters of the academic year are considered for this award.

Elizabeth Anne Cook Memorial Award

The Elizabeth Anne Cook Memorial Award was established by Colonel and Mrs. Charles W. Cook in memory of their daughter, Lizanne, a major in Fashion Merchandising, who died in an automobile accident. Junior and senior majors in Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management are eligible to compete for this annual \$1,000 award. Monies may be used for travel, training programs, workshops, seminars, forums, or other similar activities, which provide the recipient the opportunities to expand their educational and cultural interests in their major area of study.

Cobb DeShazo Award

The Cobb DeShazo Award was initiated by Dr. Mary Layfield and her husband, the late Professor Claude Layfield of Auburn University's School of Engineering. Ms. DeShazo was for many years the principal person in the Alabama State Department of Human Resources most concerned with day care for children of mothers working outside the home. This award is given to a student majoring in Human Development and Family Studies who shows the greatest professional potential for a child-study or child-service related career, specifically with young children.

Interior Design Advisory Board Award

The Interior Design Advisory Board Award was established by the Board in 1993 to recognize one or more Interior Design majors. Student majors, who demonstrate satisfactory academic progress in their program and show professional promise in the field of Interior Design, are eligible for this award.

Mary A. Layfield Award

The Mary A. Layfield Award was initiated in 1986 by the late Professor Claude Layfield in honor of the retirement of his wife, Dr. Mary A. Layfield. Dr. Layfield is Associate Professor Emeritus in Human Development and Family Studies and taught in the area of child development from 1953 to 1985. The Layfield Award is given to an upperclass student or graduate student whose academic program has focused on child development.

President's Award

The President's Award is the highest undergraduate student honor bestowed upon graduating seniors. This award is designed to recognize the outstanding graduate from each school or college who has completed at least three semesters at Auburn University with a minimum scholastic average of 3.4, including the transfer record. In addition, they must possess outstanding qualities of leadership, citizenship, character and promise of professional ability. The award is based 75 percent on scholastic achievement and 25 percent on other qualities.

Gorel Hamilton Sodergren Memorial Award

The Gorel Hamilton Sodergren Memorial Award was established by friends in 1994. Ms. Sodergren was a senior majoring in Fashion Merchandising at the time of her death. Any full-time undergraduate major in Apparel Merchandising, Design and Production Management, who demonstrates satisfactory academic progress and shows professional promise and commitment to the field of fashion merchandising, is eligible for this \$500 annual award.

Student Government Association Outstanding Student Award

The Student Government Association Outstanding Student Award is given annually to one outstanding junior or senior from each school or college. To be considered, a student must be a junior or senior and have a minimum 3.0 cumulative grade point average, be active within the school or college and in other extracurricular activities at Auburn University, and show professional promise.

SELECTED HONORS

Eta Sigma Delta

Eta Sigma Delta is the scholastic honorary society for Hotel and Restaurant Management majors. Students must be a junior or senior and have an overall grade point average of 3.00 or higher. Membership is by invitation only.

Gamma Sigma Delta

Gamma Sigma Delta is a scholastic honor society for outstanding students in Human Sciences and Agriculture. Graduating seniors or graduate students, who have a 3.0 grade point average or above and who are in the top 15% of their class, are eligible for this organization.

Human Sciences Dean's List

For inclusion on the Dean's List in the College of Human Sciences, students must be enrolled for 12 or more credit hours (exclusive of any S-U option courses), pass all courses attempted for the semester and earn a grade point average of at least 3.75.

Kappa Omicron Nu

Kappa Omicron Nu is the scholastic honor society for outstanding students in Human Sciences. Students in the upper 15% of the junior class and the upper 20% of the senior class with at least a 3.0 grade point average are eligible for invitation to membership. In addition, students must have completed two upper level courses in the major.

Phi Kappa Phi

The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi is a national scholastic honor society which recognizes and encourages academic excellence in all disciplines. Students in the top five percent of the graduating class from each college/school are invited into membership each semester.

NOTE: Some scholarships and awards may require an additional departmental application.
